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The course will run on Monday nights from 27 April 2015 to the end of April 2016, at North Inch Community Campus, Perth, 6.30 pm - 8.30 pm.

This course is open to anybody interested in working with children. It consists of 5 units:

- Play
- Child Development
- Additional Support Needs
- Rights of Children
- Working in Childcare

Participants can book on a single unit or the full course.

The characteristics of the childcare workforce are very distinctive. The current workforce statistics show this is a female dominated workforce; yet alongside this, research indicates that children really do benefit from males in the childcare workforce.

Children can spend considerable amounts of time in childcare so it is important for them to have access to both male and female staff.

Children really do benefit from having men in childcare settings as they get involved in different types of play, they can be positive role models for boys lacking in this influence in their lives and they get high levels of satisfaction which benefits the children and young people in their care.

The Childcare Strategy Team would be keen to hear from any men who are interested in taking part in future courses, if they are considering working in childcare or would like to gain additional training to enhance their future career opportunities in sports coaching, teaching or social work.



I am a childminder, and previously I have been in the minority when attending training for my role. This course has given me a network of support and the confidence to go on and get further qualifications.

I was doing a number of jobs after leaving school, but the recession meant that everyone was chasing jobs. Early Years and Childcare is a growing sector and I was able to find employment and currently work as a Support for Learning Assistant. This course has opened other avenues of employment for me.

I worked in IT, and supported my wife with her private nursery business. The demand has been such that I am helping in the nursery when required. This course has been fantastic and a great way of getting the qualification and registration with the SSSC, with the support of other men.



I worked in the building trade, but was laid off when work became slow, so I volunteered in my daughter's nursery and loved it.
The Men in Childcare night class was brought to my attention, by the teacher. I enrolled and have loved every minute of the course, and I am now considering a job with Perth & Kinross Council.

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
